Full programme

Welcome to the launch of City Now City Future, a year-long season of exhibitions, events, workshops, talks and debates looking at what it means to live in a truly global city, with an evening celebrating London as one of the most diverse cities in the world.

Tonight you will discover London-based artist and community projects where conversations, exchange and participation are the platforms for exploring identity in the city. Through fashion and food, music and film - what does it mean to be a Londoner today?

This evening also celebrates the launch of three displays which kick-off the City Now City Future season: My Point Forward, a new participative film commission by artist collective Blast Theory; Here and Now, a striking outdoor display of Niall McDiarmid's vivid street photography of the people he meets around London; and Lady Lucy: Portraits for Services, Gifts and Favours, an evolving display of portraits by Lady Lucy, inviting members of the public to offer a service, gift or favour in return for a watercolour portrait of themselves.

Citizen Slogans with Rabbits Road Press by Create and OOMK (One Of My Kind) 7-9.30pm

Rabbits Road Press, a community risograph studio and printing press, sets up shop at the museum for the evening - inviting you to print the launch programme and create your own statement posters in response to your personal experiences and relationships with London. Mix and match fonts to design and riso-print a beautiful typographic poster which you can take away for free. Technicians will be on hand to explain the activity and guide you through the design and print process.

OOMK is an artist collective who host events such as DIY Cultures, alongside producing a handcrafted biannual small-press publication, whose content pivots upon the imaginations, creativity and identity of women from diverse ethnic and spiritual backgrounds.

Create exists to explore the ways artists can contribute to the lives of people in cities - their work is primarily focused in East London. They help artists to connect more closely with communities through an ambitious programme of projects.

Rabbits Road Press is an OOMK project in collaboration with Create London, supported by Arts Council England. Rabbits Road Press is based at Old Manor Park Library and is open to the public every Tuesday.

Self-defined electronic funk space and stretched out twinkat soul – Jackal Wyfried has been producing inspired music featuring artists such as Jamie Isaacs and Kaizizi.

SPECIAL GUEST

South London-based Reprezent 107.3FM is the only radio station in the UK presented by young people under the age of 25. Reprezent isn't just about radio - they also provide training, put on debates and live events, and recently made their first compilation CD with Sony ATV called Grime n Reason. Reprezent's platforms help to form discussions around the issues affecting young Londoners through creative content - from domestic violence, to unemployment and global affairs.

Members of Reprezent will be recording vox pops from the public throughout the evening, discussing what it means to live in a city like London.

Inspiring London (L2)

Lady Lucy: Portraits for Services, Gifts and Favours 7-9.30pm

In this ongoing series of portrait exchanges, artist Lady Lucy asks members of the public to offer a service, gift or favour in return for a watercolour painting of themselves. During the evening, Lady Lucy will be painting the first of a new series of portraits in the museum, inviting sitters to make a connection with another museum visitor, echoing the millions of small exchanges that form the everyday life of the city.

Victorian Walk (L2)

Jasleen Kaur: Turbans tied while-u-wait 7-9.30pm

Artist Jasleen Kaur takes on the role of the turban tier, a sole trader and cultural craftsperson, opening up shop in the Museum of London's Victorian Walk. Jasleen will create a fictional Sikh barber shop that splices together the cultural significance of hair and the hairdresser shop — a place that creates and preserves identities from ancient African hair braiding to East London buzz cuts.

For Jasleen, the art of tying the Sikh turban was learned through the daily watching of her father's morning routine, a knowledge inherited through repetitive viewing rather than repetitive doing. Come and have your own turban tied during the evening - a practical exercise in perfecting Jasleen's tying abilities but also a look into the history of Sikh identity in Britain, further inspired by the Museum of London's own collections.

CUT Festival 7-9.30pm

Beginning as a ten day festival exploring the history and social relevance of the barber shop, CUT is a multidisciplinary artistic concept curated by Jamie Lewis Hadley which brings together artists and barbers from across the world. With East London as its main focus, the festival engages with the art and history of barbering; a celebration of community, race, gender, identity and style.

CUT will take over part of the Victorian Walk for the evening, bringing some of its London-focused programming to the Museum. Relax within CUT's pop-up social space and join in with some of the events - from performances by Hester Chillingworth and Jamie Lewis Hadley, to a chance for a free haircut on the night. Don't leave without taking home a free copy of CUT's beautifully commissioned Barbers of East London newspaper, a collaboration with photographer Paula Harrowing.

Nina Manandhar: Our Streets 7-9.45pm

Nina Manandhar's specially-curated programme of film, video, photography and archive footage explores London through the eyes of real Londoners - in particular, young people from diaspora communities making a cultural stamp on the city streets. From a journey through London via iconic music videos set in the city, to shorts exploring ideas around territory and social space, these reels of moving image and stills will be shown throughout the museum's lower galleries over the course of the evening, in response to the museum's collections.

Nina Manandhar is a photographer who specialises in contemporary youth culture and identity. She is also the founder of what-we-wore.com.

What Soho Wore Image Gallery: a selection of 'People's style images' compiled by Nina Manandhar:

As independent clubs and shops are increasingly lost from the centre of the city, What Soho Wore explores the area's rich cultural history and the role photography has had within the multiple scenes, movements and communities that have made Soho what it was and is today.
