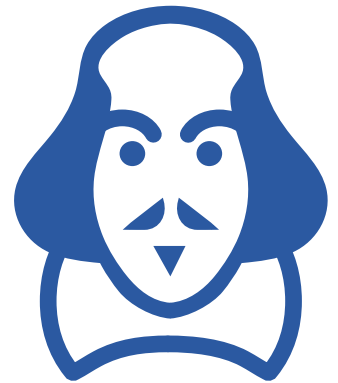
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Consequences cut-out sheet

When your collective story is revealed, it should follow this format:

[Male character] met **[female character]** in a **[where they met]**.

He said **[what he said]**. She said **[what she said]** and the consequence was **[consequence]**!

The result might be something like...

[Romeo] met **[Ophelia, Queen of the Fairies]**, in a **[London pub]**. He said **[where are you going?]**.

She said **[parting is such sweet sorrow]** and the consequence was **[they had fish for dinner]**!
