

## PREFACE AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The revised edition has its origins in work carried out in 1992-3 by David Lakin, developed by Nina Crummy in 1994 and completely revised by Francis Grew in 1998. Since 1998 the Archaeological Archive has been expanded and, in 2002, re-launched as the London Archaeological Archive and Research Centre (LAARC). Since that time a number of refinements and updates have become necessary to the Standards, as well as more detail on the presentation of some material, such as finds and environmental. In addition, the amount, variety and complexity of digital material produced in the course of archaeological projects has risen steadily to the point where it now affects virtually every type of traditional record, as well as leading to the creation of new types of records. At the same time, users of the archaeological resource have ever rising expectations of access, especially to on-line data. The Archaeological Archive has therefore made a major revision of its guidelines for depositing digital records, in conjunction with the establishing of a sound preservation and access system, and is gradually moving towards acceptance of digital-only records. Until the guidelines and systems have been tried and tested over a period of time, however, hard copy of many records will continue to be required.

The section on Digital Data was written by Ed Evans and revised by Joanna Wylie. Other contributions to the present document were made by Penny MacConnoran (MoLA, finds); Jane Sidell (English Heritage, environmental); Archaeological conservators (MoL, conservation). The present document was revised by Cath Maloney. Advice from Jane Corcoran (MoLA, Geoarchaeology) and Sarah Jones (MoLA Geomatics) is gratefully acknowledged.
