### Age of Creativity

### Digital Learning Network (DLNET)

[DLNET](#) is for those interested in how digital technology can support creative and inspiring educational experiences. It aims to encourage practitioners to talk about technology and learning in museums, archives and libraries. It is a [free annual individual membership](#) (there is a fee for organisational membership), which gives you access to their training [events](#), a [blog](#) and an active community [email discussion list about cultural learning](#) where you can ask for advice, post job opportunities and share publications.

### Diversity in Heritage Group

The [Diversity in Heritage Group](#) champions practice in diversity and equality, audience development, social justice, community engagement, and participation. They bring practitioners, policy makers and academics together to develop practice to enable the arts and cultural heritage sectors to better serve, represent and participate with, all parts of society. They run regional [training events](#) for London museums and have a dedicated [resources](#) page, which signposts you to [organisations](#) that have newsletters, journals, publications and services to support you.

### Group for Education in Museums (GEM) London

[GEM London](#) is GEM's regional area network group for London. [GEM](#) champions excellence in heritage learning to improve the education, health and well-being of the general public. GEM London runs a number of twilight sessions and social events throughout the year. The twilight sessions aim to share best practice in an aspect of museum learning practice and will include interesting case studies.
